Tom's Creek United Methodist Church Holds **Building Consecration Service**

The foundation of faith at Tom's Creek United Methodist Church on Simmons Road in Emmitsburg, Maryland, is solid and growing due to many excited and dedicated parishioners. To celebrate the recent completion of a structural addition to the church, a Consecration Service was held November 11, 2012. The church has grown in faith and structure since its formation by Robert Strawbridge around 1767 as a log church. At the Consecration Service, Frederick District Superintendent, Reverend Terri Rae Chattin, joined presiding Reverend, Tim Kromer, to officiate the service. Reverend Chattin commended, "Our 'wall of saints,' those who have gone before us who helped bring this day to light, are in the bleachers cheering us on. Let's celebrate."

Reverend Chattin put her sermon on hold as the congregation traveled through the new section of the church to the new dining area. She resumed the service and

the actual Consecration was held. Samual K. Wivell, contractor for the construction project, along with members of the building committee, stood for the presentation of the new building. The praise choir led the congregation in song as the ceremony came to a close to be quickly followed by dinner.

The church's new additions and improvements included a grand kitchen, pastor's office, study, music room and so much more.

The weekend before this service,


the congregation hosted over 1,100 people at a dinner. 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

Street Lights Going LED

The next town hall will include discussions about the plan for transitioning the town street lights into energy efficient LED lights. The town would save an estimated \$25,000 on their utility bill annually once they were installed. Mayor Briggs said that the town will also receive a 30 percent discount from the utility company as an incentive for installing energy efficient lights. The town will be able to pay for the

Foodbank, Clothes Closet & Emergency Food Assistance

AT&T claims that the installation of two 3G cell sites in the mountainous areas of Thurmont will improve voice and data signal strength in areas previously difficult to service. The sites are located along Foxville Road in the Catoctin Mountain Park. AT&T says that the installations will help customers this

winter during storms, enabling better communication in the area.

During the high level G8 Summit at Camp David this year, AT&T brought in cell sites on wheels—known as COWS. These special mobile cell sites helped boost coverage for the large event.

Founded in 1966 by Diehl Ackerman, the group was originally formed as a church chorus consisting of men and women who regularly sang in the choirs of Protestant churches. Originally called The Community Chorus of Emmitsburg, membership in the group increased to include anyone who truly enjoyed music and singing and the name was changed to The Emmitsburg Community Chorus. Under any name, the popular singing group enjoys an illustrious history.

Under the direction of Sr. Jane

Marie Perrot, the chorus had the privilege of singing at the 1975 canonization of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton in Rome, making it the first lay chorus in history to perform at a canonization. In 2009, the chorus was honored to sing at the Opening Mass of the Bicentennial and Feast Day of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton. The chorus has also performed at the Bruton Parish Church in Williamsburg on several occasions and at many special events at St. John's Church in Creagerstown.

Directed by Peggy Burrier Flickinger and featuring pianist Lisa Mattia, the Emmitsburg Community Chorus performs a series of Christmas concerts annually before breaking for Spring rehearsals in

at the Easter Sunrise Service at the Grotto of Lourdes (Emmitsburg) and helps kick off the annual Emmitsburg Community Day festivities with a patriotic concert every summer. In addition, the popular singing group is happily received by various nursing homes throughout the year. 








Superstorm Sandy/Hargadon Account

Hurricane Sandy, called by many "the storm of the century," devastated much of the Eastern seaboard with strong winds, flooding, downed power lines and fallen trees. Even though far inland, the great storm, nevertheless, affected much of northern Frederick County.

Hargadon reported that his property on Annandale Road in Emmitsburg was hard-hit by the storm. On Tuesday morning, October 31, 2012, he was surprised to see, upon inspection of his property, that half a dozen trees were down, that one fallen tree had crushed his small "Spring house," that some of his fencing was destroyed, and that a telephone pole with attached transformer had fallen across his driveway. As a result, Hargadon could not drive until the fallen pole was removed after two days. Though an assessor came out and reported that the damage to his property

was "some of the worst damage he had seen in this area," making it a "priority," it would be five full days before electricity was finally restored on Saturday, November 3.

Hargadon and his wife, Jane, were well-prepared to ride out the storm, utilizing a kerosene heater and fireplace for heat and kerosene lanterns, candles, flashlights, and headlamps for light. Though inconvenienced considerably, Hargadon was thankful that many of his neighbors pitched in to help one another in the aftermath of Sandy's wrath.


The Stanford News describes Dr. Marshall as a "world-class electron microscopist and an outstanding woman scientist, who, in addition to her research, has mentored and trained generations of graduate students."

The enormous microscope she works with was built in the Netherlands at a cost of more than eight million dollars. Over the years, Dr. Marshall traveled to Holland on several occasions in connection with the building or refitting of the microscope. At Stanford, it is housed in a custom built, climate-controlled room.

Letters from former students now working in research communities across the country, as well as letters from faculty and research colleagues, warmly supported her nomination for the O'Neill award.

Dr. Marshall's mother, a 91 year-old novelist, and several of her siblings, Kate, Elaine, and Donald, still live in the area. Her mother comments, "We seldom understand what Ann does but we're very proud of her for doing it."







Guiding Eyes for the Blind Now Accepting New Puppy Raisers in the Catoctin Region

Guiding Eyes for the Blind, known around the globe as one of the foremost guide dog schools, is now accepting new puppy raisers in the Catoctin region, encompassing Frederick and Washington Counties in Maryland, as well as south-central Pennsylvania. The nonprofit has invited area residents to open their homes and hearts in this rare volunteer opportunity to raise a future guide dog puppy.

For someone without sight, a Guiding Eyes dog is a priceless, life-changing gift, providing independence, companionship, and mobility. Puppy raisers come from all walks of life and include couples, families with children, young adults, and senior citizens. They all share a common desire to be a part of something bigger than themselves.

The McCauleys of Thurmont have experienced firsthand the joy and fulfillment that comes with raising a future guide dog. "We love dogs and thought puppy raising would be a great service project," explained Linda

McCauley, who saw a local newspaper article about the program a few years ago. "Jim and I have met many wonderful people through our work with Guiding Eyes. It's so rewarding to see the dogs with their handlers and know that you helped make it happen."

Puppy raisers welcome 8-week-old puppies into their homes, along with full support from the nonprofit, including training classes and free vet care. The volunteers love, nurture, and educate the puppies for a fourteen to sixteen month period before sending them off to their calling as a guide dog for a blind or visually-impaired person.

Like sixty percent of Guiding Eyes' puppy raisers, the McCauleys are repeat raisers. They currently share their home with a black Lab named Gibson, their third pup from Guiding Eyes.

The McCauley's first pup, Dalton, graduated as a guide dog in January 2011. He is now working with Liz Bottner, an assistive technology specialist. The family's second pup, Clyde, graduated in April alongside Joseph "JT" Fleeks, a college student at the University of Houston who lost his sight in a tragic driveby shooting. Fleeks majors in psychology and plans to become a rehab counselor for people dealing with the life-changing effects of traumatic injuries.

"Jim and I were very fortunate to see Dalton work with Liz last year," said McCauley. "We keep in touch with both Liz and JT."

Michelle Brier, Guiding Eyes' director of marketing and communications, notes that, "without the extraordinary dedication of our puppy raisers, we would simply be unable to provide guide dogs to the blind and visually impaired."

Mike "Humpy" Humerick is a native of Emmitsburg, but he's been a hunting and fishing guide in Alaska since 1979. He lives in Anchorage in the winter and King Salmon, on six-and-a-half acres, in the summer. He travels back to Maryland often. Mike is the son of the late Jack and Eleanor Humerick of Emmitsburg. He grew up one of four children, with siblings, Linda, Tom, and Dorothy.

While serving as a Weapons Loader in the United States Air Force, his twenty-year career took him to Japan, California, Kansas, Georgia, Ohio, Thailand, Vietnam,

and, finally, to Alaska. He said, "Alaska captured me the day I stepped off the airplane. I walked to the river and said to myself, 'This is home.'"

Upon retirement from his adventurous career in the Air Force, Mike's new adventures began in Alaska.

Mike's nickname "Humpy" was dubbed by a notorious Alaskan hunting and fishing guide named John Prestege. Referenced by Mike as, "THE best guide ever" in Alaska, Prestege passed away about five years ago. He left a legacy of adventure for many to enjoy. Mike learned the guide trade from Prestege and now runs his own hunting and fishing guide service called Humpy's Charters, where "Fishin's the Mission!" He's eager to share a real Naknek River experience with anglers during his hourly or half -day fishing charters

Moose, Caribou, bear, all species of Salmon, Rainbow Trout, Dolly Varden, Graylings and more; every day is a new adventure. He's enjoyed the daily bear encounters that are just part of life in Alaska. Mike said, "Bears are a by-product of fish. If you're around fish, you're going to have bears there." He said his moose hunts are always very exciting. "It's just you, God, and the animals."

There have been some hazards to the job of guiding. Mike's had bears tear his tent, a wind storm blew away his camp, and a boat blow over with two 4-wheelers in it. He takes snowmobile excursions from the McClaren River Lodge on the Denali Highway. When the highway closes in the winter, there are 123 miles of great snowmobile runs. Daily runs are about 95 miles.

Mike knows every rock and fish highway in the Naknek River. He has a knack for finding the hot spot for some big fish. He entertains with stories of fishing and hunting in Alaska. He stated, "You can't be grumpy when you're fishin' with Humpy!"

If you have a passion for adventure, Humpy will share a majestic adventure in Alaska. He encourages visitors to arrive in June or July, before the bugs come out. Give him a call at 907-439-4868 to schedule a trip.





With the holiday season now upon us, we can't help but find ourselves hustling and bustling through the next few weeks in eager anticipation of the holidays. Somewhere between the media blitz of TV commercials destined to round out our shopping lists and waiting on long lines on Black Friday, there will come a time during the holidays when the true meaning of Christmas will shine through. Until that time arrives, prepare yourself for the joyous and chaotic weeks ahead by slowing down and reading this month's Book Nook selection by author Ted Gup: A Secret Gift: How One Man's Kindnessand a Trove of Letters—Revealed the Hidden History of the Great Depression.

In the throes of the Great Depression in December 1933, a subtle 158 word advertisement was placed in a Canton, Ohio, newspaper, illustrating an unusual act of generosity at that time in history. Written under the pseudonym of Mr. B. Virdot, a surprising and overwhelming act of kindness overtook an entire town as it spread from one household to another. The article read as follows:

IN CONSIDERATION OF THE WHITE COLLAR MAN! Suppose if I were confronted with an economic situation where the bread of tomorrow is the problem of today - there is a question in my mind if I would accept charity directly offered by welfare organizations. I know there are hundreds of men that are confronted with economic problems and think, feel, and act the same way. To men or families in such position the maker of this offer, who will remain unknown until the very end, will be glad if he is given an opportunity to help from 50 to 75 such families so they will be able to spend a merry and joyful Christmas. To such men or families that will request such financial aid, the writer pledges that their identity will never be revealed. Please write: B. Virdot, General Delivery, Canton, Ohio. In writing, please familiarize me with your true circumstances and financial aid will be promptly sent.

At a time in history when pride often stood in the way of receiving alms or charity from others, the promise of anonymity to the recipients of this kindness resulted in hundreds of letters being written in response to the article. Soon Mr. B. Virdot found himself writing checks in the amount of \$5.00 each to 150 families, double the amount of the original advertisement because the need was so great in the community. While \$5.00 doesn't sound like much in today's monetary terms, keep in mind the sign of the times and what that amount truly represented.

Little did author Ted Gup know that his very own grandfather, Sam Stone, was the kind-hearted man behind the pen name of "Mr. B. Virdot." A successful Romanian-Jewish immigrant businessman that had battled back from his own bankruptcies in life, Sam provided a respite and glimmer of hope to the hardworking residents in his local community. Many of the recipients of his charitable experiment were families Sam knew from business dealings in the city of Canton.

In June of 2008, Ted Gup received an old suitcase from his mother that once belonged to his grandfather, Sam. In the suitcase were the hundreds of letters written to Mr. B. Virdot requesting a monetary gift to help their family embrace the harshness of the Depression. One by one, each letter was researched by Ted in an effort to find out the ramifications from his grandfather's kindness toward others. What he found was the legacy left behind from a man that he thought he had known his entire life. Ted learned secondhand through his grandfather, "the truest and highest form of giving is that in which the giver expected and got nothing in return."

How would you respond to an anonymous article in a local newspaper offering help during an economic crisis? Would you bother writing and/or requesting help? Better yet, would you offer financial aid if circumstances allowed for it to help your fellow neighbor? In the height of this holiday season, may you remember the words from poet Edgar A. Guest: "He has not lived who gathers gold / Nor has he lived whose life is told / In selfish battles he has won / Or deed or skill he may have done / But he has lived who now and then / Has helped along his fellow man." Blessings to you this festive holiday season!

looking back — 1871

Christmas In Thurmont, 19th Century Style

Even 141 years ago, Christmas was still a boisterous time in Thurmont (then Mechanicstown). Families decorated trees and children grew anxious about whether they had been good enough to get a good gift as December 25th grew closer.

The Catoctin Clarion noted that adults awoke early on Christmas morning as boys lit firecrackers and shot pop-guns in the air.

People traveling to Baltimore to be with family there for the holiday rushed to catch the morning train and, in some cases, the morning stagecoach. "The stage from Emmitsburg, desiring to catch the inspiring notes of Santa Claus, made the trip of eight miles in 33 minutes, the quickest trop on record of Mr. Stout's fast driving. It turned the corner of Carroll Street at peep of day, to be in time for the cars for Baltimore, with trumpet blowing and rattling wheels," the *Clarion* reported.

For those people staying in Mechanicstown, Our Lady of Mount Carmel Church was open early and "tastefully trimmed up." It was crowded with people who were attending morning Mass for the holiday.

The church had been built in 1857 as the Catholic community in Emmitsburg expanded. Fr. William

McCloskey, a member of the Mount St. Mary's College faculty, had started the effort to build a Catholic Church in Mechanicstown the year before. The church cornerstone was laid on August 30, 1857, amid an assembly of around 1,000 people from all over the area.

"A concourse of at least a thousand persons assembled from all the neighborhood villages and from the farm houses and dwellings that dot the mountains side or lie scattered in the valleys that wind among its hills, witnessed with marked attention and respect the imposing ceremonies, the ecclesiastical procession, the lighted tapers and the sacred symbol of redemption borne publicly before the Priests and Levites to the spot marked for the future offering of the Holy Sacrifice of the New Law," reported the Catholic Mirror.

The church continued to draw large crowds, especially for holidays like Christmas. The members were also very supportive of the Catholic colleges in Emmitsburg. After Christmas morning Mass, an

omnibus also left that morning from the church filled with gifts for the students at Mount St. Mary's and St. Joseph College who had remained at school during the holiday season. Their parents sent the gifts that were collected at the church.

Later in the morning, people began filling the streets with holiday cheer. Children blew tunes or just annoying shrill sounds on their tin whistles. Adults walked along the streets admiring Christmas trees in various houses that could be seen through windows. Families made sure that their trees and other displays around the tree bases could be seen easily

"Mrs. Mary Carmack had an elegant trimmed tree erected in the corner of her parlor, loaded with confections and ornaments, a music box imparting inspiring tunes and beautiful life-like dolls," the Clarion reported.

People in the region have always seemed to enjoy the holiday even when a war was being fought. Lt. Albert Hunter of Emmitsburg wrote about his first Christmas away from home during the Civil War. "Our folks from Gettysburg, Emmitsburg, and Taneytown gave us a large box of good things for a Christmas dinner, and oh how good it was. Some of the boys were away on patrol duty and we kept a share for them. When that night a rascal of our company, but from New York, stole the good things, we summarily discharged him. The Corporal of the guard took him a mile from camp and told him his life would not be worth a cent if he ever appeared at the Old Mill. I need not to say we never saw him again. Our next camp was at Hagerstown, where we had a splendid time until spring. We had the Fair Ground, and all the conveniences we could ask for, besides a jolly good time in the old barn," he wrote.

Shortly after the Civil War ended, A.W. Cissel noted that each year on Christmas Eve "a parade of sleighs headed over the snow-packed streets toward Graceham." The Moravians celebrated "Watch Night" at the church there since 1758.

Though nowadays getting coal for Christmas is considered a gift for naughty children, at the turn of the century, coal was a gift. On December 14, 1908, the Western Maryland Railway voted to give each regular employee two tons of coal

while each daily worker received a ton of coal.

The Western Maryland Railway had been an integral part of Mechanicstown since it had opened in January 1871. As the railroad extended beyond Mechanicstown, it opened markets for the community to the west as well as the east.

The joy of Christmas still continues in Thurmont. "The anticipation and excitement of a child at Christmas has not changed," Cissel wrote in her article "Christmas

Past." "Then as now, tots 'oohed and aahed' over the decorated windows of local merchants and wished for the sled, doll buggy, or train set on display. The shop fronts might change from gaslight to neon, but the wonder remains. In later years, the Lions Club sponsored an annual party at Town Hall with Santa and gifts, open to all town children. The State Theater booked special children's double features, with free matinees for kids."

Catoctin Choral Teacher Donates 30 Years

of Memories

"My fondest memories are the wonderfully talented students I worked with at Catoctin High School and the sensational chorus concerts we presented to the public," recalled Gail Slezak, a Frederick County Public School (FCPS) music instructor for thirty years. And all of those years were dedicated to the students attending Thurmont High School and later Catoctin High School (CHS). During her tenure at Catoctin—beginning in 1969 when it opened through 1995 when she retired—Mrs. Slezak compiled all of the programs, news articles, and photographs featuring the many students in her classes into three large scrapbooks.

This labor of love has recently been donated to the Thurmont Center for Agricultural History at the Thurmont Regional Library. After professional processing into archival boxes at Frederick County Public Libraries Maryland Room, former students will be able to visit this collection at the Thurmont Regional Library to reminisce about their musical experiences and events.

Born and raised in Tarentum, Pennsylvania, Mrs. Slezak sang in choirs and entertained at many community functions while she was growing up. She received her Bachelor of Music Education degree (Magna Cum Laude) from Mount Union College in Alliance, Ohio, and her Master of Liberal Arts degree from Western Maryland College (now McDaniel College). Mrs. Slezak later studied music at the Peabody Conservatory at the University of Maryland, and began her teaching career at Thurmont High School in the fall of 1965. When the new high school was built, she moved to Catoctin High School in 1969, and she began clipping and gluing memories of the vocal music department she virtually established.

During her long career, she also offered a variety of course offerings for large and small choral groups, music theory, music history, music appreciation, guitar, hand bells, piano classes, as well as American popular music.

She also served as vocal coach for over twenty CHS musical drama productions, and has fond memories of working with CHS Drama Department Chair, Mike Miller. In addition to serving as CHS music department chair, Mrs. Slezak served on Frederick County music curriculum writing assignments

In 1995, after teaching for thirty years in the FCPS system, Gail Slezak retired. She put the glue and scissors away, along with her scrapbooks. After visiting the Thurmont Regional Library several times, she realized that it was the ideal location to house these memories, so former students would have access to them. The library was happy to accept them to add to their historical collections in the Thurmont Center for Agricultural History.

Gail Slezak recently retired as Chancel Choir Director at the Frederick Church of the Brethren after forty-two and a half years, but she is still currently employed as a "sub" in two FCPS high schools. A remarkable career preserved in three remarkable scrapbooks.


Attention Emmitsburg Ambulance Subscription Club Users

tickling our taste buds

Happy Holidays, everyone! I just can't believe that it's December again...so soon. Didn't we just celebrate Christmas a few months ago? Time sure does fly by. I can gauge how quickly the time is passing by the monthly deadline for my message and recipe for *The Catoctin Banner*. It has a tendency to creep up on me—even when I know in advance when it is.

The recipe that I'm sharing this month is a Pampered Chef recipe, using crescent rolls (I should have bought stock in Pillsbury when I started my business!), cream cheese, and cherries. I demonstrated this recipe at a party recently. The combination of flavors is delicious and the finished product would make a very attractive addition to your Christmas morning breakfast. I hope everyone has a wonderful Holiday.



Cherry Cheese Coffee Cake

Coffee Cake & Filling:

2 packages (8 ounces each) refrigerated crescent rolls

1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened

1/4 cup powdered sugar

½ teaspoon vanilla or almond extract

1 can (20 ounces) cherry pie filling*

½ cup powdered sugar

2-3 teaspoons milk

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Unroll crescent dough, reserving 4 triangles for decoration. Separate remaining dough into 12 triangles; arrange the triangles in a circle on 15" round baking sheet with the points toward the center and wide ends toward the outside. Using a lightly floured roller, roll dough into a 14-inch circle, pressing seams together to seal, leaving a 3-inch hole in the center. For filling, combine cream cheese, powdered sugar, egg and extract; mix until smooth. Spread cream cheese mixture over dough to within ½ inch of edges; top with pie filling. Using a pizza cutter, cut each remaining triangle into thirds, starting at the wide edge and cutting to the point. Arrange dough strips evenly in spoke-like fashion over filling. Press ends to seal at center and outer edges. Bake 25-30 minutes or until golden brown; cool slightly. For glaze, mix powdered sugar and milk until smooth; drizzle over coffee cake. Serve warm.

*You may substitute any fruit flavored pie filling for the cherries.


Community Clothes Closet in Thurmont

On a whim, I decided to try New Win Hing in Orchard Hills Shopping Center in Thurmont. Being cheap, I went with a simple lunch special. Decor is typical carryout, with only a few booth seats, as well as a few tables. The booth seats are modern and comfortable. There is a good amount of floor space present which gives a nice airy feeling during the short wait.

I tried the chicken cashew lunch special. I hate celery, so I had them swap out celery for water chestnut.

I thought it was nice that New Win Hing would substitute celery for water chestnuts like they did. It was a relatively short wait and I was on my way back home to eat my lunch while watching a DVR full of Doctor Who.

Arriving home fifteen minutes later, I found the food still hot. Upon inspection, I realized that there was a great deal of substance—clearly worthy of being a lunch special and then some.

On the right side of the Styrofoam container was a massive amount of chicken and cashews. Underneath were the water chestnuts I specified, along with a decent serving of carrots. On the left was a fair serving of pork fried rice.

Michael Angelo Cuseo, U.S. Navy Commander (retired)

Born May 14, 1932, in the Norwich Hospital, was Michael Angelo Cuseo. Mike's family lived in Westport, Connecticut, where they took him to reside. Mike's dad was a Connecticut police officer, and was experienced from being a former New York police officer. His dad was also a professional boxer, participating in many fights while a cop in New York. When he transferred to Connecticut, he continued his boxing profession.

Mike's dad had twelve brothers and one sister. Mike's mom was a stenographer as he was growing up in Westport. His mom had three brothers and one sister, and all of his uncles—on both his father's and mother's side—were in World War II. Mike had one sister while he was growing up, and later, when his dad returned from WWII, he was blessed with another sister. Mike said his sister Anita was an interesting person. Anita was quite a horseback rider who trained Olympic horses for a guy named Steinkrauss. He said Westport, Connecticut, was a big wealthy horse town, but the Italian families were the blue collars for the community (firemen, policemen, garbage collectors, bus drivers, school janitors, and ran the stores) that catered to the extremely wealthy people of Westport. Mike's family made a very good living at being the blue collars of the town.

Mike was raised in the suburbs of a town called Greens Farms (reminds him of Emmitsburg). He said he was so skinny and slow as a kid, yet he strived to be an athlete, having no doubt in his mind that he was going to be a star major league baseball player. He also had dreams of being



a star football player, but he said he was just so skinny and slow, it wasn't meant to be-even though he still went out for every type of sports they offered at his school in Greens Farms. Mike said that at best he was mediocre, but they would keep him on the team anyway. The bigger, faster kids asked the coaches why they kept the skinny, slow kid, and the coaches would tell them "that's because he has something you lack." They would ask what that something was, and the coaches would answer "that kid won't quit and he is tenacious, and I need a guy like that, and I wish he had your weight and speed." So, Mike was always kept on the team, even if he was sitting second string. He made first string in junior high school and was the smallest guy on the football team, weighing in at 100 pounds. He said he always got bullied because of his size, but somehow he always got even with the bullies. He said he was also mediocre scholastically, because

he had such a short attention span his mind was always going in several directions at the same time.

Mike guit school the day he turned 17 years old, walking four miles into town to the U.S. military recruiting offices. He wanted to be a Marine for as long as he could remember because of the military history on both sides of his family. He arrived at the recruiting offices at 12:30 in the afternoon, and the only office open was the Navy. Mike told the Navy recruiter he wanted to join the Marines; after the recruiter had a good laugh and settled down, the Navy recruiter told him all the other offices would be closed for an unspecified time. He said the Marine recruiter was on a three-martini lunch. The recruiter then asked Mike if he would like to take a test while waiting. The answer was yes, so the recruiter gave Mike an IQ test and told him he was a genius and that he could get into several electronics programs.

Mike said that being a gullible 17-year-old (1949), he signed on to the U.S. Navy, although he had always wanted to be a Marine and to be some kind of a hero. He was put on a submarine during the Korean conflict, and, after it ended, he remained in the Navy on the submarine for nine years. Mike wanted to be the best at what he did, but at his best, he was mediocre, because he couldn't do things the way he wanted to do them and he would get so angry. The angrier he got, the more determined he got; because after nine years in the Navy he couldn't make first class petty officer. The best he could do was second class petty officer. He was very frustrated after going out for it three times, and, then, lo and behold, the Navy decided to give him a commission as Commander. Now he was an officer and apparently his mediocrity disappeared, because everyone he had worked for thought he walked on water.

Thereafter, everything worked for Mike (I think his ego got the proper boost it needed). Mike said he was the luckiest man in the Navy, because no one saw his mistakes and everyone saw his accomplishments; he always seemed to be in the right place at the

Mike did military duty all around the world while in the Navy and had many exciting adventures, and he had his family with him most of the time. Mike met his wife Donna while working at a resort when they were both attending college. He said he dated all the girls that worked with Donna before he dated Donna. Mike and Donna were married on July 30, 1955, while going to college in Oakland, California. They have four children: Michele, Teresa, Jeanie, and Vincent. Mike gives Donna all the credit for raising them.

In 1974, Mike and Donna moved to the Emmitsburg area after finding the little farm they now live on. They love it there, especially Mike, because it reminds him of the area he lived as a child—Greens Farm, Connecticut.


Mike retired as Naval Commander in 1984 and started growing vegetables and herbs. He also cuts wood to burn in the winter. He loves to cook, coming from some great Italian cooks, like his grandmother. I got to sample one of his famous sauces at lunch and I admit it was good. Donna said now his head will grow larger than it already is.

I enjoyed my interview with Mike, and I learned a lot of things about him and all of his adventures that I did not have the time to share with you in this issue. However, I will write of his many adventures in future issues of The Catoctin Banner.

Mike is still skinny and slow, but being 80 years old and recently having a hip replacement, he is entitled to be a bit slow. He loves to talk to friends, neighbors, and strangers, and will tell you all about his thirty-seven years with the U.S. Navy. So, if you meet Mike, shake his hand, pull up a chair, and he will tell you some interesting stories.



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

Starting now at your local libraries, you can take advantage of free help with taxes, employment opportunities, and computer instruction. Through a series of community partnerships, the Thurmont Regional Library and the Emmitsburg Branch Library are offering the following services:

Job Assistance

A new partnership between Goodwill of Monocacy Valley and the library offers free employment assistance at weekly workshops in Thurmont's small meeting room on Tuesday afternoons from 2:00-4:00 p.m. Interested citizens can drop in anytime during the session to learn more, or they can call 301-662-0622 (ext. 210) to register through Goodwill. Participants will get oneon-one help with resumes, applying for jobs online, and practical advice about seeking employment in the local area. Goodwill's goal is to solve transportation issues for North County citizens who cannot get to Frederick, and the library was the perfect comfortable location.

Tax Assistance

The library has partnered with United Way of Frederick County, Mount Saint Mary's University, Seton Center, Inc., and the Housing Authority of The City of Frederick to create an IRS Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) site at the Emmitsburg Branch Library, 300 South Seton Avenue in Emmitsburg, in 2013. Specially trained volunteers from Mount Saint Mary's business classes will provide free assistance in the library's Community Room every Wednesday from Noon-5:00 p.m., every week from February 6 through April 10, 2013. Through the IRS VITA program, median to low-income tax payers are able to access free tax prep services for simple returns for individuals earning less than \$51,000 annually. Advance registration required by calling 301-662-0294.

Computer Basics for Beginners

The Thurmont Library offers an on-going introductory threepart computer class with sessions starting in January, April, July, and October, 2013. Registration is taken at the library information desk or by calling 301-600-7212. During the three-session program, participants get a better understanding of the actual parts of a computer, as well as understanding basic technical terminology. They will learn to use a mouse, search the Internet effectively, and get tips about online safety. At the last session, each participant learns how to set up their own Internet E-mail account and develop an understanding for managing emails.
