



Eligibility for membership in the AMVETS Ladies Auxiliary is limited to the mothers, wives and grandmothers, regardless of age, and to the daughters, sisters and granddaughters, not less than 18 years of age, of regular members of AMVETS; to mothers and widows, regardless of age, and to daughters, sisters and granddaughters, not less than 18 years of age, of deceased veterans who would have been eligible for membership in AMVETS; and female veterans who served honorably in the armed forces of the United States after September 15, 1940.


Eligibility for membership in the Sons of AMVETS is limited to all male descendants, grandsons, adopted sons and stepsons, fathers, husbands, widowers, and brothers of members of AMVETS and deceased members of AMVETS, or service personnel who died and would have been eligible for membership in the parent AMVETS organization, and are at least 18 years of age and not eligible for membership in the parent organization. This is not to include in- laws of any type.


for displays or their own fundraising activities. A number of businesses in the community have also joined in the effort by becoming sponsors and will be exhibiting in the business and industry area of the Fair.



Welcome to the Catoctin Church of Christ!

Recently, I had the pleasure of a "divine appointment" with Pastor Richard Long, who was most gracious in providing me with a tour of the beautiful new worship space and grounds for the recently relocated Catoctin Church of Christ. This area church was founded in March 1996, when four families from Thurmont and two from nearby Sabillasville decided to

bring a Bible-centered church to town. Originally, the church rented property on Route 15 in Thurmont. The land upon which the new church sits was acquired in April 2008 at public auction from the Thurmont Co-op. With countless prayers and financial assistance from the brotherhood, construction began in February of this year and Pastor Long happily reports that the first service was July 14, a blessed moment for his congregation. Pastor Long is most appreciative of Palmer Construction, who was "fantastic to work with" and also to his new neighbors, who have been universally supportive.

Kenneth Hoover (Education Minister/Counselor for the Catoctin Church of Christ) writes eloquently about the relationship between the new church and the great house of God, the people who follow Christ, "this new house is a tribute to the grace of God. It is only by His unearned, unmerited and undeserved favor that it radiates to His glory in this community. It is a tribute to the sacrificial faith of the people of God. This new structure is the completion of a journey of faith- trust in the God of glory that moved and motivated His people to give sacrificially that He might be worshipped and served more fruitfully." The new building is a call for the Catoctin community of Christians to share Christ's love and His Good News with everyone.

What type of church is the Catoctin church of Christ? The mission statement asserts that "the Catoctin church is a group of Christians, baptized into the body of the one and only savior Jesus Christ, who strive together to serve him. We regularly meet together to study God's word, to worship God, to pray and to encourage each other." The worship services follow the biblical pattern of worship with acappella congregational singing, prayer, study of God's word and weekly partaking of the Lord's Supper. Pastor Long is emphatic that "God's



word is the guide for everything," thus all preaching and teaching is directly from the Word of God. This is a strong, bible-based church that "speaks what the Bible speaks" and performs Baptism by immersion.

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The worship space is beautiful and the meeting rooms spacious and bright. Moreover, the Catoctin Church of Christ is a visitor-friendly congregation where you will be made to feel welcome. You will never be singled out or embarrassed. Although a collection will be taken at each service, visitors are not expected to contribute, although they may if they so choose. Pastor Long asks you to visit and simply sit and listenor better yet, participate! This is a wonderful time to visit!

The worship times are: Sunday Bible Study with classes for all ages at 9 AM and worship at 10:00. (The worship service lasts approximately an hour to an hour and fifteen minutes.) The new building is completely handicap accessible and a staffed nursery is provided for your convenience. The Sunday evening worship begins at 6 PM and a midweek Bible study is held on Wednesday at 7 PM, again with classes for all ages. There is also a Bible study for ladies on Monday at 7:30 PM.

Please note that Pastor Long will conduct a Gospel Sing and Brotherhood Dedication Ceremony on November 2, a joyous event to which all the area churches of Christ are invited! The service will begin with thirty minutes of singing, followed by a brief Biblical message and conclude with thirty minutes of congregational singing. Also look in your mailbox for "Heart to Heart," a publication of the Church of Christ with beautiful spiritual insights and reflections!

Catoctin High Wrestler Wins National Title

The Middle Atlantic Wrestling Association kicked off the spring wrestling season in March with over 11,000 wrestlers competing at thirty-four different district qualifying tournaments in over seventeen states. The top three district place-winners in each age/ weight class have the opportunity to advance to one of four regional tournaments, representing the North, South, East, and Western sections of the Mid-Atlantic states, where the competition becomes increasingly stiff. The top four wrestlers from each region advanced to the National tournament in May, held in Salisbury, Maryland. The sixteen-man brackets are loaded with talent and only half—the top eight—will become All-Americans when the dust settles after two days of competition.

MAWA district tournament placers: 1st place—Ethan Fuss (Intermediate 75), Charlie Perella (Advanced 152), Colin Schildt (Elite 160), Brad Maze (Open 220); 2nd place—Nolan Brightshue (Intermediate 85); 3rd place—Justin Peters (Intermediate 105).

Charlie Perella won four straight matches to become the Western regional champion in Shippensburg, Pennsylvania, in April, and to secure a spot in the sixteen-man bracket at MAWA Eastern Nationals. He then went 4-0 in Salisbury, Maryland, to claim the Eastern National Championship title and All-American status at 152 pounds, knocking off some impressive wrestlers along the way-including a former PJW state champion—in overtime during his quarterfinals match. On the second day of competition, he narrowly won his semi-finals match by a score of 1-0 and beat a four-time New York State placer, two-time New York State champion, and three-time MAWA national champion by a score of 7-2 in his finals match to post a perfect, undefeated tournament record. Perella, who was also a MAWA All-American in 2011, becomes only the second Catoctin wrestler ever to win a national title. Jeremy Fuss, a current Catoctin Youth Wrestling coach, won the same honors in the mid 1990s. Other Catoctin wrestlers to place at the tournament include Seth Chilson in 2007, Josh Small in 2010, and Kevin Simmel and Patrick Guilday in 2012.

Perella also had the unique opportunity to represent Catoctin High School, Frederick County, and the state of Maryland, as he earned a spot in the starting lineup of the Maryland Cadet National Greco-Roman and Freestyle Wrestling Team over the summer.

He won three gold medals in state qualifying tournaments and silvered in both styles at the MSWA State Championships at 160 pounds in Greco-Roman and 152 pounds in freestyle. He travelled to Fargo, North Dakota, for the annual USAW Asics Cadet and Junior National Wrestling Championships in July, considered to be the Olympics of high school wrestling. In Greco, he wrestled to the third round, losing an eight point bout the eventual fourth place finisher. In freestyle, he bested his performance of the previous year by wrestling all the way to the fifth round in a 74-man bracket before being eliminated. His only losses of the tournament, in both styles, were to nationally ranked 3rd, 4th, and 5th place Fargo All-Americans. "...wrestling through the summer and having the opportunity to tangle with these guys, at that level of competition, win or lose, will definitely make me a better wrestler this winter," Perella said when asked about his experience. "Those guys are awesome wrestlers, I scored points against these guys, but I still have some work to do to achieve my goals."

Perella, who will be a junior this fall, was a CHS wrestling team captain, the CHS 2013 Coaches Award recipient, and the 2013 Hub Cup's outstanding wrestler. He won the 2013 Frederick County, 1A-2A West Regional, and Maryland State Championship at 134 pounds. He was recognized by the Maryland State Chapter of the National Wrestling Hall of Fame and Museum in Stillwater, Oklahoma, and named to the FNP All-Area, All-Gazette, and All-MVAL 1st teams, as well as the MSWA's All-Academic team. He was a finalist in both the Greco-Roman and freestyle state championships, finished the scholastic season with a 39-5 record, and is currently ranked #4 in the state of Maryland.


I do need to mention that I have a wonderful hair stylist and friend. Yonnie, if you ever try to leave, I will hunt you down. My hair needs







Have you seen the commercial on TV about hair or beard coloring that is, "Just for Men?" I may be a little weird, but I have thought a lot about that product title, Just for Men. There seems to be fewer and fewer things that are just for men. Police and Fire departments are no longer just for men. Combat roles in the military are no longer just for men. I traveled a few years ago on a short-term mission trip to Russia and stopped over in Finland and discovered that restrooms are no longer just for men, they are unisex. But I am digressing.

Not too long ago, a brightly colored flyer appeared in my mail box. It was from St. John's United Church of Christ and St. Mark's Lutheran Church in Sabillasville churches around the bend from my home. Inside the flyer I found information and a phone number for their Help Hotline: Food Bank serving the people of the Mountain area. Curious, I called the number on the flyer and had a great conversation with Jo Willard, a board member since its beginnings thirty-three years ago in the 1980s. She said the Food Bank serves sections of four counties on the Mountain: Frederick and Washington Counties in Maryland and Adams and Franklin Counties in Pennsylvania. With the support of over twenty local area churches, 100 percent of the donations go directly to those in need. The space to collect, shelve, store, and distribute donations is found in the bottom of the Episcopal Church of

the Transfiguration in Blue Ridge Summit, Pennsylvania. That's the church on the Summit Plaza with the bright red door. To the side is a beautiful, tranquil garden.

"The need is great," Jo stated. In June, the food bank provided food and provisions for thirty-five families and seniors on a tight budget. In just the first week of July, they provided twenty-three families with picnic boxes, including fixings for s'mores. Last Christmas, they delivered wonderful gifts to sixty children. "That was double from the year before," said Jo. Asked about school supplies for students, she added, "We never refuse anything. We do have notebooks, paper, folders, and binders but need pencils, erasers, glue, crayons, felt pens, and back packs."

"People are so generous. One man donates money to pay for a pound of hamburger each month at Sanders Market. That really helps when there's a need for perishable items

We can all appreciate that youthful energy and stamina.


What to donate? Non-perishable items: cereal; juice and canned fruit;

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
My Friend




Thurmont Artist Shares Catoctin Nature





The C&O Canal Bike Trail is approximately 184.5 miles long, starting in Washington D.C. and ending in Cumberland, Maryland. The Troop and Venturing Crew 270 break the trail up into four sections and complete a section at a time—usually on Memorial Day weekend or Labor Day weekend—taking four years to complete. The scouts learn so much about the history of western Maryland and the uses of the canal during the ride, while seeing some beautiful sights along the trail.

Troop & Crew 270 started at Reagan International Airport and rode north to Brunswick. The first day was eighteen miles, with a stopover in Carderock State Park for the night. The Scouts spent the afternoon hiking, rock climbing, and exploring the park; adult leaders enjoyed the sun and down time to recouperate. The Scouts met another Boy Scout Troop 396 from Virginia to camp next to, both troops blended well and a fast game of Manhunt was underway.

A Scout Masters last words rung out in the night air "No running in the dark." To our dismay, two injuries occured, with visits to the ER. Boy Scout Troop 270 & Ventruing Crew 270 were unfortunetly able to put their new Wilderness First Aide training to use. A member of 270 had to be splinted and hiked out of the camp by backpack stretcher for a leg injury after triping over a tree stump while running. A member of 396 was patched and guided out for an eye injury after running into a tree. Both were treated and released by Suburban Hospital. Their weekend was cut short, but the rest of the bike trip was uneventful, with beautiful views to look at while biking the trail. After approximately sixty miles on Sunday (a total of seventy-three miles), the Scouts arrived at the Brunswick Camp ground.

fitness matters Expert Answers to your Health and Wellness Questions

Question: I have a few friends encouraging me to buy organic. There are obviously two sides to every story, so I'd love to hear your take on the pros and cons of organic

Answer: There is definitely an ongoing debate about whether you should eat organic foods or not. Some say eating organic is a nobrainer because of the potential ingestion of hormones, antibiotics, pesticides and other dubious additives found in conventionally grown foods. On the other hand, some argue that organic foods are similar in nutritional quality, yet they cost more and aren't all that accessible. Here's the real deal. Although it's true that organic foods are more expensive, there is a legitimate reason for the added cost. More care, time, and money go into growing organic crops, and those costs are typically passed on to the consumer (much like products in other industries). Even if they are more expensive, many folks would argue that the added cost is worth it because organic foods are healthier for you. Though this may seem logical, there really isn't a lot

of research to back up this claim. Several studies tout the benefits of eating more fruits and vegetables regardless of how they're grown. If the nutritional quality of the food doesn't sway you, there's also this idea that organic farming is better for the environment. This may be true, but you need to remember to buy locally-grown foods. If you happen to live in California, but your organic produce is grown in Florida, you're doing more harm than good from an environmental perspective. Bottom line—if you can afford it, and you can buy local, go for it! If you do decide to make the switch, focus on purchasing these foods first: peaches, apples, sweet bell peppers, celery, nectarines, strawberries, cherries, lettuce, imported grapes, pears, spinach, and potatoes. These are known as the "Dirty Dozen' and generally have the highest concentrations of pesticides. You should also get in the habit of washing your produce thoroughly before eating!

suggested getting a personal trainer, but they can be pricey. Is hiring a trainer worth it?

Answer: Absolutely! The right personal trainer can literally transform your life. They're there to educate, motivate, and inspire and, frankly, that's worth its weight in gold. From goal setting and proper exercise form to program design and diet advice, trainers will have the answers. But that's not even the best part. Trainers offer accountability, friendship, and a much-needed support system as you embark on your wellness journey. Let's face it—we all struggle with getting to the gym now and then. But trainers can make working out a lot of fun, and they can challenge you consistently, which will ultimately get you better results. Look at it this way: if your car needs to be fixed, you take it to a mechanic because they know what they're doing. The same can be said for your body. Take care of it as best you can, and if you need help, seek out an expert at your local club. Just make sure they have solid credentials, and a strong background in fitness, kinesiology, strength and conditioning, or sports medicine.

Question: Everyone seems to do something different when it comes to carbs, proteins, and fats. Some advocate higher carb, some higher protein, and some very low fat. How do I know who's right?

Answer: This is a great question, and a somewhat difficult one to answer, since it really depends on

your goals. Keep in mind, there is an Acceptable Macronutrient Distribution Range (AMDR) for each macronutrient. Generally speaking, you should shoot for 45-65% carbohydrate, 20-35% fat, and 10-35% protein. If you're an athlete or you're focused on the cardio end of the exercise spectrum, then you should be more liberal with your carb intake, while getting adequate protein and fat. If you're focused on strength training and you're looking to add mass and size, you'd be wise to aim for 50% carbohydrate, 25% protein, and 25% fat. If you want to lose weight, it may be advisable to decrease carbohydrate intake (to a level of 40-45%), and then slightly increase healthy protein and fat consumption. Remember, these percent changes may not seem like much, but there's varying calorie levels associated with each of these goals. Again, the recommendations above are generalities, but hopefully, they shed some light on the direction you might want to head in based on your specific health and wellness goals. And, of course, the focus should be on consuming whole grains, unsaturated fats, and lean proteins whenever possible. As always, if you need more personalized recommendations, talk to a certified personal trainer or a registered dietitian.



Chewy Ginger Snaps

3/4 cup of vegetable oil 1/4 cup mild molasses

1 cup brown sugar (packed)

1 egg

2 cups all purpose flour

2 tsp. baking soda

1/4 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. ground cloves

2 tsp. ground cinnamon

2 tsp. ground ginger

1 cup granulated sugar

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

In a large bowl combine oil, molasses, brown sugar, and egg. Add flour, baking soda, salt, cloves, cinnamon and ginger. Stir to combine.

Put granulated sugar in a separate small bowl. Roll dough into 1" balls by hand (or use a small cookie scoop; they are going to go flat on the bottom when you bake them) and roll each ball in the white sugar. Place sugared balls 2 inches apart on a baking sheet lined with parchment paper.

Bake for 10 to 15 minutes or until slightly golden brown. Cool completely. Store in air-tight container. Makes 2 and 1/2 dozen cookies.

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



looking back — 1967

Thurmont Loses Its Railroad Station

Thurmont was originally called Mechanicstown, but a movement in 1873 strived to come up with a more progressive name for the growing town. Among the supporters of a name change was the Western Maryland Railroad.

September 2013

"The railroad was all for the idea, since it would relieve the shipping and passenger problems caused by a profusion of the 'sound alike' communities. There was Mechanicsburg and Mechanicsville, Pennsylvania, and several Mechanicsvilles in Maryland, as well as our town," according to A Thurmont Scrapbook.

The Western Maryland Railroad had first reached Mechanicstown on January 9, 1871. The first stationmaster was Harry Shriner.

"Upon the event of the coming of the railroad to Mechanicstown, a group of civic-minded citizens arranged a reception and a banquet for the railroad officials and their guests. It was a big event, taking place in the Stocksdale Warehouse, located beside the tracks at the end of Carroll Street," George Wireman wrote in the Catoctin Enterprise in 1972.

The warehouse served as a temporary depot for the telegrapher and expressman until a permanent depot could be built on the site of the old cannery in Thurmont. The depot had two waiting rooms, an office for the stationmaster, and telegrapher and sanitary facilities. The grounds outside were landscaped, and there

was a water tank at either end of the depot.

By 1890, six-passenger mail and express trains (three eastbound and three westbound) ran through Thurmont daily.

In 1914, Thurmont even had a milk service train running to Baltimore, Maryland.

During 1923, a young man named S. Elmer Barnhart started working for the Western Maryland Railroad. He was a fresh graduate from the Dodge Institute of Telegraphy and State Agency in Valparaiso, Indiana. He had been born in Greencastle, Pennsylvania, and served in France with Base Hospital 98 during World War I. Barnhart began his career with the railroad at Edgemont but soon moved to Rocky Ridge's station.

"Part of his job involved relaying basketball results by Morse telegraphy from Mt. St. Mary's College to the Associated Press," George May wrote in the Frederick Post in 1967. Barnhart took over operating the Thurmont station in September 1939. "The peak of his career was in 1952 when he was freight, ticket, and baggage agent and operator at Thurmont; agent for the Railway Express Agency; Mayor of Thurmont, which included being superintendent of the Municipal Light Company and Chief of Police; and an elder and financial secretary of St. John's Lutheran Church of Thurmont," May wrote.

As automobiles continued to gain favor as a form of transportation for



Americans, the Western Maryland Railroad stopped passenger service to Thurmont on March 1, 1957. Freight and mail service continued, though.

Occasionally, a few special trains would be scheduled to carry passengers on special excursionsusually to Pen Mar Park.

"On Saturday, October 12, 1963, the local station resembled a scene from the pages of history when large crowds gathered to ride the special excursions to Pen Mar Park, located a short distance west of Blue Ridge Summit in the beautiful Blue Ridge Mountains," George Wireman wrote.

With little notice, the Western Maryland Railroad closed the Thurmont depot on January 13, 1967. "The need for the station diminished during recent years because of more modern accounting practices in Hagerstown, which took over the work of the Thurmont Agency," Wireman wrote.

Many people assume that the decision to close the depot came about because Barnhart retired on January 1, 1967, at age 65. He had spent forty-four years with the railroad and twenty-seven years in charge of the Thurmont train station.

"On April 4, 1967, the fate of the station was soon learned. A wrecking crew appeared on the scene and began demolishing this Heritage Landmark. Within the short period of three days, a stranger visiting the site would never have realized that a railroad station once stood on this very spot," Wireman wrote.


While the trains still run through Thurmont, they no longer stop in the
