Robert Maichle is a 13-year-old character from Blue Ridge Summit, Pennsylvania. He was born with developmental disabilities and autism that complicate his daily life. He also suffers from seizures and is very impulsive. His safety is always a concern. When he was recently approved for a service dog from 4 Paws for Ability out of Xenia, Ohio, Robert and his family became responsible for raising \$13,000 to purchase his service dog. An anonymous donor gave the money Robert needed.

Robert, along with his family, will travel to Ohio in October 2014 to meet his service dog. His dog, which will be named in honor of the donor's husband, will be trained to comfort Robert and to help him remain calm. He will also perform search and rescue if Robert should wander off.

On November 16, 2013, a benefit 5K walk/run was sponsored by the Monterey Country Club in Blue Ridge Summit. The overall winner of the 5K walk/run was Robert's

brother, Christopher, with a time of 19:31. There was also a vendor sale with \$1,200 of the proceeds (after expenses) donated to help another child at 4 Paws for Ability. "T-shirts and bracelets are still being offered, and there are other fundraisers planned," Robert's mother, Stacie Massett, said. She added, "We have also decided to make this an annual event to help other children and to help with the annual cost of the service dog. We still have a trip to

Mike Hartdagen has always been a kind and helpful person. He is known and loved by most people in the areas of Emmitsburg, Fairfield, Thurmont, and Rocky Ridge. Mike has had problems with his heart

for quite a few years now. He was experiencing episodes of swelling up with fluids, and he received every test there was for his symptoms. He was continually told they could not diagnose the problems he was having. While getting out of bed one morning, he passed out. In the hospital after this incident, several new tests were performed. The doctors found that his heart was only functioning 15 to 25 percent of normal function, and he was passing out because of fluid covering his heart. They placed him on a heart transplant list to give him a healthy harvested heart.

Mike has been unable to work because of his heart. Mike and his wife, Carole, have a son, Bradley, and their bills are now solely Carole's responsibility, because she is the only one employed.

The Sons of the American Legion Squadron 121 held a fundraiser for Mike and his family. The Fundraiser grossed very close to \$10,000. The net amount they received will help them for a while, and, if

needed, more fundraisers will be held in the future. SAL Squadron 121 would like to thank everyone



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



Snow Rules

With the winter months ahead of us, the town commissioners are asking that residents remember to park cars on the designated side of their streets during snowfalls (signs are posted) so that the snow plows can maneuver more easily. The snow removal ordinance also requires that snow is removed from sidewalks and walkways on your property within 24 hours of the end of snowfall.

Free Holiday Parking

Free Holiday Parking in the down town area will be available again for shoppers. Signs will be posted on the parking meters on or around the week before Christmas and the week after Christmas.

Emmitsburg Park & Ride

Emmitsburg will be getting the Park and Ride site that they have desired for the past five years. The Maryland State Highway Administration (SHA) has agreed to buy an 11-acre plot of land, located south of Route 140 and East of Route 15 for the site. It will consist of a paved area for parking and be lighted. The Park and Ride will alleviate the overflow parking that was occurring on Silo Hill. Estimated time of completion is the summer of 2015.

Special Election for Thurmont Commissioner

The Election of John Kinnaird as Mayor of Thurmont has left an open Commissioner's seat. The Nominating Committee meeting will be held on Tuesday, December 10, 2013, at 7:00 p.m. at the town office. Thurmont residents interested in running for this seat will need to do one of the following: (1) Attend the Nominating Committee meeting with one resident nominating them and one resident seconding the nomination; or (2) Write a letter to the town stating their intent to run for this office, along with one resident signing to nominate them and one signing to second the nomination, mailed to arrive at the town office on or before December 10. The special election for this seat will be held on Tuesday, January 7, 2014, at the town office. Voting hours will be 7:00 a.m.-8:00 p.m.

Feeding 1,200 People a Month

The Thurmont Ministerium has reported helping 350 families (totalling 1,200 people) in the month of October this year with their Food Bank program. The Thurmont Ministerium—a group of 15 churches—pulls their resources to contribute to local families. The people who help with this program report that the cuts to the Federal Food Stamp Program have hurt these families. The Thurmont Minsterium is trying their best to do what they can to help. Many of the families in need have serious health issues, which prevent them from working or working on a full-time basis. For those who can help, there are boxes for canned goods located at both Food Lion and Weis Market, as well as the Town Hall. They are also accepting baby diapers, paper towels, and toilet paper. Food Bank dates for December are: Tuesdays—December 3, 10, and 17 (sign-up starts at 5:30 p.m. and pick-up is 6:00-7:30 p.m.); Fridays—December 6, 13, 20 (signup starts at 3:00 p.m. and pick-up is 3:30-5:00 p.m.); Food Bank is closed on December 24 and December 31.



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












Blue Christmas Worship at Trinity United Methodist Church

Dr. Jon A. Moles, of Gateway Orthodontics in Thurmont, has been practicing orthodontics since 1995. Prior to that, he was a dentist for 11 years in the Navy. He retired from the Navy in 2003 and has been running a private orthodontics practice ever since. He received his Bachelor of Science degree in Biology from the University of New Mexico and his Doctorate of Dental Surgery from the University of Missouri-Kansas City School of Dentistry. He learned quickly that the field of dentistry is moving so fast that it is very difficult to keep up with all the advances. He chose to specialize in orthodontics which aligned nicely with his prior background and love of mechanical engineering. With only 15 orthodontists in the Navy, Dr. Moles feels very fortunate to be selected and trained while in the Navy. His Naval career was the perfect example of the Navy's tag line of "Join the Navy and see the world". He traveled often, spending time in Spain, Italy, France, Bermuda, Japan, and both coasts of the United States. He retired as Director of Orthodontics at the Naval Postgraduate Dental School in Bethesda, and felt that Frederick County was a nice place to raise his family.

He said, "The people are amazingly welcoming in this town. I started one day a week when I opened Urbana and was lucky to have one potential patient per day. In Thurmont, we've consulted with over 60 potential patients since the end of June. That's pretty good and an encouraging sign that we made the right decision to come to Thurmont." He added, "I combine all of my experience with these images to quantify every movement through the shortest path to the desired result. If I can't get there, I will tell you that up front,

customers requires a basic consultation where Dr. Moles takes a look at a patient to determine where the patient is in their dental developmental cycle. He says a young patient is ready for a consultation when the permanent teeth start to come in - around age seven. He'll look for habits

and other problems that may impact development and determines whether normal development is taking place. If he feels there is a need, he will ask for a dentist's x-rays for the patient. If they are not adequate to fully diagnose and plan your treatment need, Dr. Moles will ask you to drive to his Urbana office where he has a 3-D x-ray machine. "It is a bit of inconvenience for the patients until I get my new x-ray machine at this office, so to ease the burden a bit, I give gas cards to help cover the cost of traveling. It is the least I can do to help our patients get the treatment they deserve."

When the development shows it is necessary, Dr. Moles will recommend removal of baby teeth, but most of his time is spent monitoring, talking, and teaching. He said, "I feel it is best to assess, monitor, talk, teach, and coach, so I can learn and educate each patient about what is normal for them. There are many times that patients have been told they needed braces but it just may be too early to start, or little or no benefit at starting so early. I just monitor them and recommend treatment when, and if, necessary. It's me helping each patient by doing the right thing at the right time."

When a patient is considering moving from another orthodontist for a consultation with Dr. Moles, he will usually ask to consult with the former orthodontist in order to gather facts in an effort to provide the best service and treatment options and to save as much of the patient's investment as possible. There are many situations and circumstances and each one of them is different and requires individual consideration. He said, "All we can ask for is our best judgment in every situation. In my opinion, the patient

always comes before money. I'll do my best for each patient."

For adults who have interest in orthodontics, Dr. Moles takes a different approach than other orthodontists might. First, he determines if they are okay functionally. If teeth are stable as an adult, he'll question why the patient wants to change that. He said, "When it becomes only about aesthetics, we need to determine if we should really change the functional aspect of their bite. If the answer is yes, we'll formulate some modulations that show a course of action. But, if the treatment plan is not fully customized for each condition, we take the risk of creating an unstable situation." Dr. Moles will work to meet each patient's goals without creating an unfavorable result. There are many alternatives. Of course, when starting with an unstable structure to begin with, even as an adult, he can formulate a plan for improvement.

In the short time that he has been in Thurmont, Dr. Moles said, "I really need to thank the community. They have accepted me as one of their own. I'm really happy I'm here and look forward to building the same great practice and reputation that I have in Urbana. The practice is starting to grow. It is very exciting.'





Thurmont Rail Heritage Mural Unveiled

Though what was depicted on the mural on the side of the original trolley station on West Main Street in Thurmont was supposed to be a surprise, the blustery winds kept flipping up the edges of the tarp, giving people a sneak peek of what was underneath. Undeterred in their quest for a full view, a crowd gathered in front of it on October 26, 2013, as Yemi, the surprise's artist, gave the tarp a tug to pull it down. On part of the side of the building was an original painting depicting the Thurmont trolley station, Western Maryland Railroad Station, and Catoctin Mountains. It was a celebration of Thurmont's rail heritage on a piece of Thurmont's rail heritage.

The side of the old trolley station has three recessed areas. Yemi's painting takes up one of those panels. The goal is to fill the other two areas with original paintings that highlight Thurmont. "My vision is to make this building a jewel in the middle of Thurmont," Yemi told the group. "They can come here and see our history."

Yemi lives in the Thurmont area, but he was born in Nigeria. His father was a tailor and his mother made wedding dresses. When he emigrated to America, he attended the Pratt Institute and earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts and a Master of Science in Art and Communications Design.

He has done drawings for many Fortune 500 companies, including AT&T and American Express. He has illustrated several children's books, as well as more than 200 greeting cards.

He has also designed more than 300 postage stamps for countries like Russia, St. Vincent and the Grenadines. His "Girl Group" series of stamps are part of the Rock 'n' Roll Hall of Fame in Cleveland, Ohio.

His work can be seen in other places in Frederick County, Maryland. He has painted murals and large paintings in the Courtyard by Marriott lobby in Frederick, The Common Market in Frederick, and the Creekside Plaza Building in Frederick. His "Pillars of Frederick" mural is 1,280 square feet and is one of the largest murals in Maryland.

The Monarch is perhaps the best known butterfly in the United States. Its wings feature an easily recognizable orange and black pattern. It's famous for its overwintering migration to Mexico and California. This migration is threatened by habitat loss in North America. Over the past few years in our area, we have noticed a sharp decline in Monarch butterflies. Milkweed is their primary source of food and the Monarch eggs are laid on milkweed leaves.

Milkweeds are declining due to development and the adoption of herbicide resistant corn and soybeans when growers spray fields.

The National Wildlife Federation (NWF) provides a backyard habitat certification program (www.nwf.org) for anyone who is interested in creating a habitat in their back yard to attract interesting wildlife.

Kinnaird, Hooper, and Burns Win Thurmont Election

Thurmont recently completed its town election. However, they are still without a full board of commissioners.

John Kinnaird was sworn on as the new mayor on November 1, 2013. He won the October 29 town election with 716 votes. Rosie Bentz, the other candidate for mayor in the election, received 100 votes.

Martin Burns, who served as mayor for the previous twelve years, decided to step back and allow a new mayor to helm the commission. He, instead, ran for one of the open commissioner seats. He received 592 votes in the election, and will now serve, once again, as a town commissioner—a position he held before he became mayor.

"I thoroughly enjoy working and doing what I can for the citizens of Thurmont," Burns said during the November town meeting.

Wayne Hooper was the top vote-getter among the commissioner candidates. He received 613 votes, and will continue to serve Thurmont as a town commissioner, just as he has for the past twenty-four years.

"I feel humbled by the trust the citizens have in me," Hooper said a few days after his election.

Newcomer Ronald Terpko, Jr. lost his first race for town commissioner. Though he received only 333 votes, he is credited with bringing some

new voters to the polls.

Kinnaird swore in Hooper and Burns for their commissioner seats on November 1.

With Kinnaird's election as mayor, his seat on the board of commissioners is now open. A special election will be held on January 7, 2014, to fill the seat. According to the town charter, the election must be advertised for 49 to 55 days. A nominating convention to put forth candidates for the open seat will be held December 10.

Any Thurmont resident who is not a registered voter, but is interested in voting in the town special election, has until December 10 to register at the Thurmont town office.

When the new board of commissioners sat down for their town meeting on November 5, 2013, Kinnaird told the commissioners, "We've had a good working relationship; we're going to continue that and move forward.'

During the meeting, the board of commissioners voted Commissioner Bill Buehrer mayor pro tem. It will be his job to serve as mayor whenever Kinnaird is absent. Burns, who nominated Buehrer, said that it would give Buehrer an opportunity to do something he hadn't had a chance to do yet as a commissioner.

Voter turnout for the town election was 25.4 percent.



CHS Softball to Hold Crab Cake Dinner



My sister never thought that baking cakes would someday help someone. This year, I called her and asked if she was going to bake a cake for the Thurmont/Emmitsburg Community Show. She's only really made cakes for family members' birthdays, baby showers, and weddings. She said she hadn't thought of ever doing this to help someone. She agreed whole heartedly to put the work into baking and decorating a cake for a cause. She said we need to find a cause to donate the monies raised—something local.

So, I contacted the Thurmont Office of Woodsboro Bank and asked them what we could do to help the community and raise funds for a local cause. We all put our heads together and a few days later came up with the Coblentz Family. Michele Coblentz lost her husband Terry in a car accident in July. He was the bread winner of the family, owning his own company. They have three children between the two of them: Tiffany, Terry, and Trevor. Trevor got Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever at age 2 1/2 and then Meningitis and is now brain injured. He has special needs and is confined to a wheelchair. Unfortunately, to add to the loss of a husband and father, Terry's accident involved the handicapped accessible vehicle they used for Trevor.

My sister Rebecca Eaves baked a 3-layer decorated cake and entered it in the Community Show. I contacted lots of friends, family, and businesses in the immediate area and told them of our plans to raise money for this family. They were all willing to help; fourteen in all.

At the cake auction on September 6, 2013, I was ready with the donation promises, so I could buy this cake. Not surprisingly, Rebecca won a first place blue ribbon for her decorated cake.

Some others were bidding against me, but I was determined to win the cake. It went up fast: \$400.00. \$500.00, then \$600.00 all this for a cake and a good cause! You could hear the crowd getting louder and louder in amazement. At that point, I only had a little more than \$600, so I was nervous I'd lose. But the other bidders suddenly stopped! I told the auctioneer I had \$635, and I'd buy it for that. He said SOLD! That was close!

On Monday, I went up to Rebecca's house and picked up the cake from her refrigerator. I delivered a piece to everyone that helped purchase the cake, along with a thank you card for their donation. I then received a call from someone who said she was out of town during the auction, and her husband was at the auction, but hadn't purchased a cake that night. She heard what we were doing, asking if she could add \$200 to the donation. I'm now up to \$835.00 for the cake.

I gathered up all the checks for donation and mailed them to the Community Show. I enclosed a letter telling the story. Mr. Rodman Myers called me and said he was very touched with the letter and for wanting to help the family. He asked if the Community Show itself could add another \$200.00 to the cake. Of course I said yes and now we were up to \$1,035.00 for the cake.

Last Friday, we met the Coblentz family at the Woodsboro Bank location in Thurmont for the first time. Michele was very grateful and couldn't believe we would do something like this. It was a joint effort with so many. She wanted to have the names of all the donors so she could write Thank You notes to them, but we told her that since she had too much going on that we had already taken care of Thank You notes and the people that donated know she is very appreciative. It was so very nice to finally meet the family.

And last, but certainly not least, we want to thank all of the donors for the purchase of the cake. We are so grateful for your kindness and generosity. The

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Fort Ritchie: A Short History

I often walk the trail from Fort Ritchie around Lake Royer, the Upper Lake, and back. There is a peace and quiet that surrounds the place, and the autumn show of color is spectacular—like no other I've experienced. The history of the area is unique, too. So, I did some exploring, researched through books, and asked lots of questions.

The South Mountain has a rich history of service. Long before the colonists settled in the area, Native American Indian paths crisscrossed the land, connecting tribes in the area and providing routes for trading and socializing. Colonists quickly found the trails, laid claims, and began building homes. The land was rocky and difficult to farm. So many offered their barns and homes to travelers who repaid them with coins or goods. From the wealthy in their coaches and fine clothes to itinerant families, hunters, and rogues, the mountain people provided shelter, food, drink, and a good night's rest for those traveling from Philadelphia and New York to Baltimore and Virginia.

Around 1815, Samuel M. Royer realized it was only a matter of time before the railroads laid tracks in the area, and so he began buying up property. He also had a vision of building a lake on part of his property. His son-in-law, Thaddeus Wastler, built the lake after Royer's death. In 1889, the Buena Vista Ice Company of Philadelphia purchased 400 acres of land where Fort Ritchie now stands, and the purchase included Lake Royer.

During the winter months, the company used Lake Royer to harvest natural ice and ship it to southern markets-including Baltimore and Washington—through the Western Maryland Railroad's Baltimore-Hagerstown line. Consumers wanted fresh produce and milk products, and, before electricity, the ice harvest met this need. Again, the people who lived in the mountain were the workers who harvested the ice, stacked the blocks, and covered them with straw. In 1903, a spur of the railroad was built near the icehouses, helping to get the ice to cities more efficiently. However, the soot from the trains became a problem, so Wastler built a second "upper lake," where the ice stayed clean.

From the late 1890s and up until World War II, the area around Lake Rover served as a recreational destination for city dwellers from Baltimore, Washington, New York, and Philadelphia. Escaping the summer heat, the wealthy from these cities enjoyed the cool breezes on the mountain. A sandy beach was formed from tons of imported fine sand, bathhouses were constructed, and water-racing activities took place on the lake. Elegant hotels and homes were built to accompany all the wealthy visitors. The Pen Mar amusement park and High Rock were favorites. The resorts provided jobs and employment for the local residents, and the farmers delivered fresh produce, eggs, and meats for the hotels and dinning areas.

In 1926, the Maryland National Guard purchased 400 acres for a new summer training camp and named it Camp Albert C. Ritchie, after the then governor of Maryland. The two lakes were included in the purchase. In June 1942, during World War II, it became a Military Intelligence and Psychological Training Center and home of the Ritchie Boys. From 1947 until June of 1951, Fort Ritchie returned to Maryland and became a hospital to treat chronic diseases. It was a natural fit, as the State Sanatorium for Tuberculosis had been located in Sabillasville since the early 1900s. Many homes in the area became treatment facilities for those with contagious illnesses, later turning into group homes for children. From 1960 to 1980, Fort Ritchie once again became part of the Army, serving as a communication center for the military. The base was closed in 1998, and was sold to the PenMar Development Corporation in 2006. It was resold to Corporate Office Properties Trust for mixeduse development, and then began the building of the present day Community Center, serving the residents in the area. In 2012, the 591 acres—including Fort Ritchiereturned to PenMar Development Corporation; it oversees the property today.

People often ask, "What's the future for Fort Ritchie?" No one can predict for sure; but, for now, it serves the Mountain communities—

enjoy its facilities, walk its paths, and be a part of its rich history.





During his retirement years, the late Gilbert V. Eiker, Sr. of Emmitsburg, shared stories of his life with others, as he went about his daily chores. Deb Spalding, publisher of this newspaper and owner of E Plus Copy Center & Promotions, came to know Mr. Eiker, as he frequently visited her store on his way to buy groceries. He would tell stories about freezing in France during the

stories of his youth became the foundation of her children's book called, Big Chief Hungry Belly. Mr. Eiker knew of the project and read the draft of the book before his passing on December 21, 2012. 



spots on his brain that are damaged. Caleb was diagnosed with torticollis of the neck. They thought he had a stroke at birth due to his not moving the right side of his body.

Caleb has been in therapy since two weeks of age. He will have developmental delays and learning delays as he grows. He is now in need of braces on both legs, costing \$1,800 each, in addition to a compression garment for his body, costing \$2,500. These are to help stabilize his body as



he grows. He has also been fighting salmonella poisoning on top of all his other health issues.

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The Mulhern family got behind on everything, due to Rebecca being out of work. Caleb is a full-time job right now, with three different therapists and lots of different doctors. Rebecca's husband also got laid off in June and that didn't help matters. My Veterans Day Bus Trip to Visit Our "Heroes Memorials" in Washington D.C.

I had my alarm clock (my wife Joan) set for 5:00 a.m., and, sure enough, she woke me on time. I slowly got out of bed, so I could take my morning medication and shave and shower and get ready for the bus trip I have been trying to make for the past four or five years. I was so excited about the bus trip to the memorials, not because I had never seen them before, but because this time I would not be pushing someone in a wheelchair and taking group pictures. I would actually be able to visit the memorials as long as I wanted, and walk places I hadn't been able to before. I hope I am not sounding selfish, but all I wanted was a day among our heroes all for me.

I left my house without eating breakfast. I need food shortly after taking my medicine; being so excited, I forgot to eat. I stopped at a McDonald's on the way and got an Egg McMuffin and ate that while on the way. I arrived at The American Legion parking lot in Thurmont at 7:15 a.m., and the bus was scheduled to leave at 7:30 a.m. The American Legion and AMVETS of Thurmont take turns co-sponsoring this Veterans Day trip every year; this year, it was the American Legion's turn. I arrived at the same time as my buddy Dick Fleagle, and we exchanged good mornings and boarded the bus. We actually got the first set of seats behind the bus driver, "Tammi," who was a very nice person and a very experienced driver. She maneuvered that bus in places most people would have had a hard time putting a car. We had to wait past 7:30 a.m., because you always have a few that simply can not be on time. Finally,

Then we went out to where the Bell of Freedom was. The person holding the rope presented the rope attached to the Bell to me and I was allowed to ring it for freedom. We then proceeded to Women Heroes War Memorial. I was very impressed at what I saw in the displays and heard from the greeters. I took numerous pictures of the displays and individuals from our little group were in some of them. The women from the USA Armed Services

Wars and Conflicts. I had never been to this memorial before and what a valuable lesson I was taught.

Dick, Donnie, and I went next to see the grave sites of John F. Kennedy,

Jackie Kennedy Onasis, and the Eternal light that shines over them. I observed the Washington Monument in all its stature with the scaffolding surrounding it for its renovation. I spent enough energy walking that I enjoyed every bite and finished it all. When all else returned and finished eating we proceeded to our next leg of the trip.

Tammi stopped across from the Lincoln Memorial so we could depart the bus. She gave us the time to be back and said she was going to find a place to park while we were touring. Dick and I went to visit the Vietnam Memorial, but couldn't get very close to it as they were holding a ceremony there. The Wall was packed with people trying to find friends, loved ones and family etched on the wall. I got some great pictures from a distance thanks to a telescopic lens. We then walked over to the



World War II Memorial. I got some good pictures there and talked to some veterans and family members of veterans who have passed on. I was asked by a young couple to take a picture of them with their phone camera. I did and they were happy with it which in turn made me happy because I am not familiar with those gadgets. We then walked over and sat down on a bench and watched the ducks and seagulls floating around in the water. The Lincoln Memorial was next on my agenda. Dick and I went to it and I took the elevator up and spent some time in awe of the wonder of the extremely large statue of Abe Lincoln seated far above me in a chair. I got a few pictures of Abe and some other things associated with him. I went back down in the elevator and Dick and I went over and sat down. Some people came over who had never been to the Korean War Memorial, so Dick and I pointed it out to them, The lady's name was Candi (I think she is a retired votech teacher) and her husband and son were with her. We were sitting there a little while longer when Ed and Donnie McKinnon came along, stopped and we shot the breeze for while. Then we went to the snack bar where we were meeting the bus. We sat at a table watching planes come in for a landing every couple of minutes at Reagan Airport. As we sat there, a sudden drop in temperature came and it was cold. Finally the bus arrived and we loaded on for the trip home. The trip home was as pleasant as the trip to. Everyone enjoyed our bus driver and could easily see why she was driver of the year 2012 and, as far as we are concerned, should be driver of the year 2013. A tip collection was taken for Tammi and everyone gave. "Thank You, Tammi."

I am very pleased with the trip and hope to do it again next year. Maybe I will be able to see the laying of the wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.





Press seams to seal. Spread each rectangle with 1½ tablespoons of cheese to within 1/4 inch of the edges. Top with 1 slice of ham and then the spinach leaves.

Starting at the short side, roll up each rectangle; pinch edges to

IHA's Vice President of Construction and Development, Ron Morris, supervised the repair process. The home needed new siding, hardwood floors refinished, bathroom tile work and a complete interior paint job. The cost of the repairs, about \$10,000, was included in the mortgage loan from USDA, and Judith didn't have to wait until everything was completed before moving in.

In Maryland, this is a brand new type of Self-Help program. IHA is the only nonprofit that has received a technical assistance grant from USDA Rural Development to provide this program in Frederick County, as well as Carroll and Washington counties.

Carol Riggles, IHA's Homeownership Coordinator, photographed and followed the transformation of Judith's home from start to finish. She said, "It's easy to see that this home was a diamond in the rough, and once the walls got painted, the floors were refinished, and the exterior siding was replaced, it became a home that Judith will cherish for years to come."

looking back — 1905

On the Road to Disaster

Editor's Note: This is the first in a series of three articles about the great Ransom train wreck in 1905.

Perhaps the railroaders' minds were on a tomorrow they would never see. Such thinking might, in part, explain some of their actions on June 17, 1905. The Western Maryland Rail Road train schedule would change on Sunday, June 18, 1905, but that was the next day. On Saturday, June 17, Flagman George Lynch and other members of the freight train crew were waiting with their train on a siding at Gorsuch, Maryland.

Lynch's eastbound train had pulled onto the siding at 4:25 p.m., to wait for three westbound trains to pass.

"While we were waiting, we all got down from the train and sat on a pile of ties near the track. The two engineers and the conductors had their time cards and schedules and we talked for awhile about the time we were making, how long we had to wait for No. 5, and where we would run to after she passed," Lynch recalled for the Catoctin Clarion.

Drawn by engines 41 and 43, Lynch's freight train was eighteen cars long and heavily laden with coal. Once the three westbound trains had passed, the line would be open for Lynch's train to continue its eastbound journey to Baltimore; but with only one set of tracks to travel, the other trains had priority.

The crew waited for "considerably" more than an hour. The Union Bridge Accommodation, No. 17, passed on time. Then came the No. 11 Blue Mountain Express, also on time for its first trip of the season.

Lynch retold the events that followed to a newspaper reporter for the Catoctin Clarion.

With a few minutes left before the third westbound train, the No. 5 Thurmont Express, was scheduled to pass, Lynch walked away from the group to get some water at a nearby spring. When he returned, the engineers were in their respective engines. The firemen were shoveling coal into the fires to build up a head of steam.

"Jump on board if you're going," one of the engineers called.

Lynch looked at his watch once again. By his reckoning, they still had a few minutes before the train could leave, but he wasn't going to be left behind. He grabbed a handrail and pulled himself aboard the moving train.

"Where are you fellows going to pass the No. 5?" Lynch called to the fireman.

"At Lawndale," was the answer he thought he heard over the noise of the steam engine gathering speed.

Lynch couldn't believe the answer. There wasn't enough time to



get to Lawndale if the No. 5 hadn't already passed.

"For God's sake, look at your watch!" Lynch shouted.

The fireman waved his hand at Lynch as if nothing was wrong. Lynch wondered if his watch was simply wrong.

"There were two engineers, the two conductors, and the firemanfive in all—who had the time and knew the schedules as well as I did," Lynch said.

"Evidently, the engineers or conductors had gotten confused as to how many trains went by," said local Thurmont historian and train enthusiast George Wireman in a 2005 interview. "But how they could get so mixed up about ordinary work has been a question mark for years."

One suggestion raised by *The* Washington Post was, "The fact that a new schedule goes into effect tomorrow may have caused some confusion." The new schedule had the westbound No. 5 nine minutes slower in reaching Westminster, Maryland, because a stop in Glyndon, Maryland, was added. If the crew was thinking that day that the No. 5 was on the new schedule,

then they would have thought the train was further east, possibly about four-and-a-half miles further east than it was. Had this been the case, the freight train would have had time to reach the Lawndale siding.

Another possibility is that since the Blue Mountain Express was making its first run of the season that day, the crew might have been expecting only two trains and not three. However, according to Lynch's version of events, the crew knew a third train was coming and thought they would have time to pull over.

Lynch said in the Frederick Daily *News* that he considered pulling down the air brakes, but he deferred to the greater experience of the other crewmen.

The No. 5 had left Hillen Station in Baltimore City, Maryland, on time at 5:00 p.m. About onehundred passengers were aboard. The train had three passenger coaches and a baggage combination car. Most of the passengers sat in the coaches. It was eating up the route at thirty miles per hour.

The baggage car was filled with railroad workers, many of whom lived in Thurmont, Maryland, and Catoctin Furnace, Maryland—two towns next to each other in northern Frederick County. The workersthey were called "floaters," because they traveled to where they were needed to work—had boarded the train at Mount Hope, Maryland, where they had been working to repair the damage from a small freight wreck there during the week prior. The train was so crowded that some of the men had to sit on the bumpers between the baggage car and the engine tender, and between the baggage car and the first passenger car.

It was a choice most of them would not live to regret.
